Alex Ross died in Miami at the age of Alex Ross died in Miami at the age of 71. He was born in Dornoch, Scolland, came to America in 1900 and was a pro in. Boston 13 years and at the Detroit Golf Club 30 years. He won the U.S. Open in 1907, the Massachusetts Open six in a row and the North and South five times. Horace H.
