

Account of the Earl of Sutherland charge against  
the Government for his Militia.

To charge of convocating the fencible men in the nine  
parishes of Sutherland in order to be reviewed by  
Lord Sutherland

To subsistence of Captain Gunn's Independent Company  
in Sutherland on their way to Inverness not yet paid  
by him. To charge of raising drafts of men from time to  
time for supplying the Independent Companies in place  
of those relieved

To 200 men with Officers stationed on the confines of  
Caithness to prevent the disaffected in that country  
from passing thro to join the rebels from 4th Sept:  
to 18 Oct under command of ? and Mr Clunes and 100  
men under Mr Clunes command till 4th february

To Robert Gary's account for guarding the passes into  
Sutherland on the Ross side as an advanced guard to  
alarme the country if the rebels designed to enter it  
to pass through into Caithness to raise the men of the  
country.

To charge of keeping spies on the height of Ross to  
get intelligence of the rebelles motions

To Major MacKay's charge sent to the Dk: of Argyle  
by expresses sent through the country from time to time  
with my Lord's orders to the Officers and men.  
To expresses sent to Lord Reay and Caithness.

To expence of the private intelligence of Caithness.

To expresses to General Cope Lord Loudon and the President

Charge of reviewing the 4 companies of fencible men.

To the said 4 companies pay from the 14 February to the  
1st May 1646. 1746

To the charge of rendezvousing a 5th company under command  
of William Sutherland

To the pay of Wm Sutherland's company of 100 private men  
-- from the 19th April till the 1st May

To guard kept at Helmsdale Brora Dunrobin Ferryoons  
and Big Ferry from  
to take up rebels that might pass through and to  
examine passengers.

To express to the Duke with intelligence while at  
Invss. and ----

To Lord Sutherland' 4 baats attending Lord Loudon  
while in the county

and possessed and damaged  
by the rebels when they entered it conform to the  
account of the losses of the parish of Golspie and  
being £50 sterling to be taken from that account and  
added to the militia charge

To the charge of further 6 boats that attended Lord Loudon  
and not brought to my account as yet but charge here  
completed to £75 .s.

To the charge for maintaining the rebell prisoners taken  
in this country from the time they were taken till put  
aboard the man of war

To Carol and Baillie Kenneth & afterwards several expresses  
sent from Sutherland to Lord Sutherland for advice what  
to do while the rebels were in the county
