Provision of Airports.

At a recent meeting of my Executive Committee the General Manager of the Scottish National Development Council (who is a member of the said Committee) reported that his Council had urged upon Local Authorities the desirability of providing aerodromes, and landing fields for aircraft, throughout Scotland, with a view to facilitating transport for the business community.

My Committee had under review more particularly the development of air travel for touristic and holiday purposes, and I was able to report that numerous inquiries reach these offices as to the feasibility of visiting Scotland by air.

I was accordingly instructed to write you to the effect that my Committee associates itself with the attitude of the Scottish National Development Council in this matter, and to request you to suggest to your Council, with all due respect, that they give serious consideration to the points raised in the Council's circular of 29th May, 1934, if they have not already done so.

You are no doubt aware of what has been done in other countries in this direction, and, in these days of intense international competition for tourist traffic it is considered most desirable not to allow Scotland to fall behind in the provision of facilities for air travel; and I am to point out that the unfortunate effect of a lack of aerodromes is bound to be increasingly felt both nationally and locally, the longer the lack persists.
