

Dear Sir,

Dornoch Water Supply.

With reference to letter received by you from the Department of Health for Scotland, dated 29th September, 1937, I have to make the following report:-

The source of the present water supply to the Burgh of Dornoch, namely Loch Lannsaidh, is a fairly large Loch situated in moorland country some seven miles north west of the Burgh, there being no agricultural land within a mile of it. The gathering ground being of a peaty neture, however imparts a peaty character to the water so that it contains a fairly large amou-nt of dissolved vegetable matter. The quantity of water available at the source is in my opinion amply adequate for all possible requirements of the Burgh, and reports of analysis of samples of water taken in the Burgh indicate that the water is of fair quality. The proportion of free ammonia found was low while that of albuminoid ammonia just reached the limit usually prescribed for a potable water. This high proportion of albuminoid ammonia and the rather large amount of dissolved organic matter also found I consider to be due to vegetable matter at the source.

At certain times of the year the capacity of part of the present pipe line has proved inadequate in serving all consumers, and I consider the proposed works of enlarging the pipe line highly desirable.
