7. All exhibits must be in Lairg not later than 12 noon on the day preceding the Exhibition for the purpose of judging. No exhibit shall be removed before 4.30 p.m. on day of Exhibition.
8. A 1st Prize shall count 5 points, a 2nd 3 points, a 3rd 2 points and V.H.C. 1 point. The Co-operative work shall be awarded 100 % allocated as follows:—50 % for standard of work, 20 % variety, 20 % display, 10 % percentage of members competing.
9. A representative from each competing Institute is requested to attend the unpacking and placing of her Institute's exhibits, bringing with her a complete list of entries and any unused labels. Institutes unable to conform to this rule should inform the Show Secretary and forward her a list of entries, so that arrangements can be made for checking.
10. One attending member from each competing Institute should arrange to be available during judging if required to be consulted on any point, and to take any notes.
11. An entry fee of 6d will be charged on each article entered for competition. The entry fee for Co-operative work is 2/6. No article will be accepted for competition without entry fee.
